

1. Bocote (cordia gerascantus)

A small tree seldom growing larger than 12" in diameter. Heartwood is a yellowish brown accented with black lines. Freshly cut Bocote has a green tinge, and is oily to the touch.

2. Cocobolo (dalbergia retusa)

A medium size tree growing up to 2 feet in diameter 90 feet tall. Heartwood varies from a bright orange to a deep red with attractive varied stripes of yellow, black, and orange. Darkens on exposure. A fine texture and excellent color make Cocobolo one of the most popular exotic woods.

3. Zebrawood (microberlinia brazzavillensis)

Also called Zebrano, this tree can reach in excess of 150 feet. Diameters commonly measure between 5 and 7 feet. Heartwood is light golden-yellow with streaks and veining of dark chocolate brown. Dries slowly, and tends to surface check and end-split during seasoning. Coarse texture and interlocked grain must be surfaced with care. High luster finish on this hard wood make it extremely decorative.

4. Birdseye Maple (acer saccharum)

A medium to moderately large tree growing up to 90 feet high. The heartwood and sapwood are not usually distinguishable. The term "Birdseye" is derived from the small eye-like markings on the wood. This is a very popular wood for veneer. The fine, hard grain makes it ideal for turning.

5. Bubinga (guibourtia demeusii)

Bubinga is a very distinctive wood from West Africa and is quite representative of wood from that part of the world. Heartwood is reddish-brown after darkening from exposure. Some pieces display fine, evenly spaced lines of a darker hue.
